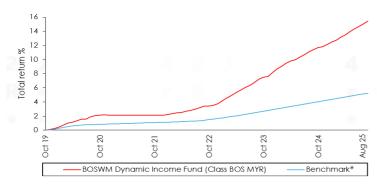

### **Fund Commentary**

- The portfolio's bond allocation increased from 37.97% to 41.31% due to net purchasing activities. During the month. the Fund sought yield enhancement from a AA1-rated short-term bond from the secondary market. Given the yield compression following the Overnight Policy Rate (OPR) cut in July, bond investments will be selective as we see limited visibility of a second OPR cut in the near-term.
- The Fund will look for switching opportunities for its bond exposures without taking on undue interest rate or credit risk. Current growth and inflation backdrop remains conducive for corporate credits and the Fund will look for opportunities to increase exposures within the AA rated segment for yield enhancements.

Eauity

In August, global equity markets gained 2.4% as global trade outlook improved after the US tariff suspension ended with most countries spared from the worst tariff rates portended by the US administration. The much-welcomed clarity boosted equities in export reliant countries such as ASEAN, China and Japan. In the US, markets held up well thanks to the positive second quarter earnings despite a weak non-farm payrolls report as well notable downward revisions to earlier reports. The weak July labour market data led to market participants boosting the chance of a Fed Fund Rate cut in the September meeting in the swap markets. Fed Chair Jerome Powell offered his most dovish statement this year at the Federal Reserve's Jackson Hole retreat, as he took stock of the weakening labour market. In the semiconductor space, plans for a 10% US government stake in Intel led to optimism in the US semiconductor space. Emerging markets gained 1.5%, led by China as the country extended the trade truce with US until 10 November. China also announced it will aim to triple the country's chip supply in 2026, which led to a rally in domestic chip and technology counters. Index movement during the month in local currency terms: Europe (+0.6%), Hong Kong (+1.2%), Japan (+4.0%), Malaysia (+4.1%), Singapore (+2.3%), Shanghai (+10.3%), Taiwan (+2.9%), Thailand (-0.5%), and US (+1.9%).

FBM KLCI recorded a strong index return of 4.1% in August as the country clears the US trade uncertainty after ending up with a 19% tariff on its US exports. The second quarter reporting season has yielded decent result, supporting our outlook for a robust second half return in 2025. The construction sector (+5.9%) lead the sectoral return in August for a second consecutive month driven by contract flow announcement as well as tailwind from the 13th Malaysia Plan revealed in late July. The technology sector (5.6%) was the second-best performer as data-centre order books supports earnings outlook despite Trump's threat to impose severe tariffs on chips manufactured overseas. The finance sector (5.6%) recovered from the Overnight Policy Rate (OPR) in July as a trade truce could mean further reduction in the OPR could be shelved. During the same period, the Malaysian Ringgit strengthened against the US Dollar, rising to 4.225 per US Dollar from 4.265.

#### **Fixed income**

In August, US Treasuries (UST) rallied, driven mostly by Powell's Jackson Hole dovish pivot. He suggested that the balance of the economic risks has shifted following the soft July inflation and labour market report. Nevertheless, the longer-end treasuries saw weakness as the Fed independence is questioned after repeated demand from the US administration to lower interest rates and the attempted removal of a member of the Fed's Board of Governors. The UST curve steepened with the 2-year yield falling 34bps, the 10-year yield falling by 15bps and the 30-year yield rose by 3bps.

In Malaysia, front-end government debt led the yield compression as the market anticipate an interest rate cut by the Fed as soon as September. Malaysia's second quarter final Gross Domestic Product (GDP) expanded at 4.4% year-on-year annualised, slightly missing consensus estimates, while inflation remained subdued at 1.2% year-on-year in July. Meanwhile, traders continue to price in another 25bps Overnight Policy Rate (OPR) cut by 1H26 in the domestic interest rate swap markets. The Malaysian Government Securities (MGS) 3- and 10-year benchmark yields fell to 2.985 (-6.5bps) and 3.386% +1.4bps), respectively while the AAA grade corporate 3- and 10-year yields fell to 3.52% (-2.1bps) and 3.75% (-2.2bps), respectively. Foreign holdings of Malaysian bond/sukuk fell for a second consecutive month in July, declining by RM5.5 billion as traders likely locked in some profits post the OPR cut. Malaysian government securities saw the largest decline with a RM5.2 billion outflow.
